<p>Key Issues / Themes / Messages</p>	<p>Climate emergency – presentation by Xtinction Rebellion – commit to change – what will you do /what are you doing/what can we do as team Leeds.</p> <p>We need to aim for an 85% reduction in carbon footprint by 2040. There will be a PEG sub-group set up to lead on this, and work to galvanise Health and Care system response in 2020. The Health Partnerships Team are leading on this. Third Sector organisations encouraged to sign up for the Climate Commitment.</p> <p>Update on LTHT new hospital plans – plan to complete by Dec 2025, including new children’s hospital (LGI) and Pathology Lab at St James’.</p> <p>Shaping Leeds for future generations, presentation from Prof Paul Stanton (consultant who has been commissioned to work with Health and Wellbeing Board/PEG on this) – Leeds is doing really well, as is West Yorkshire ICS, we are ahead of the game in terms of integration, system leadership and commitment etc. but still have our challenges e.g. smoking, loneliness, health inequalities.</p> <p>The need to strengthen to role of the third sector as an equal partner in health and care was highlighted – third sector highlighted as part of ‘Leeds lucky cloverleaf’ of strengths:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Inclusive Growth 2. Plans to address Climate Change 3. HWB Strategy 4. Third Sector <p>System resilience plan – update since work from Newton Europe, reducing length of stay and increasing people getting the right care. Reduced waits for social work assessments etc. BUT the system is under pressure and utilization is at 98% as opposed to the optimum 85%. 4 obsessions have been identified to ensure timely discharge to the right place and will be the focus of the</p>

next 6-12 months. Now three clear pathways out of hospital – little/no support, some support, more support e.g. care home placement.

Leeds Health and Care plan – this is being updated, is outcomes focused (as per Health and Wellbeing Strategy); the approach – start with people, we deliver, we are team Leeds. It's still a work in progress so any comments to Paul Bollom – paul.bollom@leeds.gov.uk

Local Care Partnerships/Primary Care Network Update (LCPs/PCNs) – PCNs (19) are a function of LCP (18) – so far been very business focused on the practicalities and must do's. They have all assessed themselves against a maturity matrix (kind of outcomes star) to see how well developed they are in key areas. LCPs focusing on population health management approach – starting with frailty and other identified priorities in each area.

Strong focus in LCP development work around Third Sector being a key part – role of Forum Central Third Sector and Communities LCP Development Manager (Pip Goff) highlighted.

Shaping Our Future Programme Leeds CCG –

Leeds CCG have commissioned Deloitte to adapt and think about the longer term future of commissioning.

Trends are moving away from competition to collaboration with commissioners and providers, continuing to support system integration, using contracting in an integrated way.

Leeds CCG will be engaging with partners (including the Third Sector) about this early in 2020.
