<p>Key Issues / Themes / Messages</p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Leeds Plan discussion including obsessions (prevention, care closer to home, mental health) and linking obsessions (inclusive growth, poverty, children, safer Leeds). Suggestion from Cath Roff to consider a different format of Building Blocks, Interventions, Enablers and Strategies. Suggests there is further to go on this... Timeline is for Leeds Plan next version to be circulated in July / August to PEG, then to go the Health & Wellbeing Board in September and then for public consultation in Autumn beginning with the Leeds Big Chat. Consultations with local Committees are ongoing with key themes of access to GP, access to mental health services, citizen inclusion in LCPs, link to wider determinants of health and role / voice of carers. 2. Estates presentation with alignment to wider plan / priorities and focus on most deprived areas plus plans to make better use of existing estate. Need to link health to housing growth and plans for mapping assets including 3rd sector assets. Themes of estate strategy will be Community, Condition, Culture, Capacity and Cost – and added at the meeting, Climate. 3. Integrated Commissioning Framework was presented for discussion / approval. Priorities of CCG and LCC to improve health and wellbeing, reduce inequalities and promote / maintain independence. Focus on prevention and early intervention, enhancing services in local communities. Developing value based commissioning based on outcomes. Recognition of diverse and vibrant 3rd sector and fragile / fragmented independent care sector. Population health management / data driven approach. <p>Raised concerns which were supported about the approach to 3rd sector in the framework. The right things were said in the meeting and in part in the paper (3rd sector is important, vibrant and a commissioner as well as a</p>

	<p>provider). The actions though do not really reflect this, with language about commissioning the 3rd sector to deliver services rather than shaping the way they are commissioned. Raised the issue of power imbalance between statutory organisations and the 3rd sector and need to be more explicit in the document so that this is addressed. Agreed that further discussions were required (with Caroline Baria initially) to make sure the wording reflects this more inclusive intention.</p> <p>Also requested that end of life care is mentioned as a priority area alongside a long list of others.</p>
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
