

























Background



International Day of Disabled
People (IDODP) happens every
year around the world to celebrate
the achievements of people with
disabilities.






The events took place from

people get connected from their homes.


Activities and Events



Leeds for All was made up of events and activities which took place online using zoom, youtube and facebook. There were films, performances, workshops and exhibitions.

300 people came to the live events and over 1,000 people watched our films, activities and workshops on YouTube.



Accessibility




The event was planned by disabled people for disabled people.



The planning team tried to make the event as accessible as possible.

The aim was to show good practice when holding an event that was online and included everybody.

This was done by:

Making a programme of events that could be used with screen readers and autistic people.

2 Making the programme in plain text, braille and with audio description versions.


Adding subtitles and British Sign Language to lots of the events and videos.

Asking people for their accessibility needs when they booked an event.

Giving support with technology to people who took part in the events.

Giving people who hosted sessions a guide on how to talk to people with visual impairments, people who are deaf or hard of hearing and people with autism.

Social Media and Advertising



The event was promoted widely using email, websites and bulletins.





In total we reached 118,034 people across our social media channels.



We also used social media to get in touch with people as we couldn't use posters and printed materials like we usually would.



The event was advertised on the Big Screen in Millenium Square.

"Please do more, this community has been extremely isolated under covid-19, events like these help them reach each other"


"It was as accessible as it could be, given the circumstances"

> "It was very informative but had a relaxed atmosphere which was nice"


"Amazing. The speakers were fantastic and so inspirational"

People also said the event was accessible for people with additional needs.


Discussions

- Will shift to "everything online" be permanent?
 Probably not: people are anxious for human contact
- Newly disabled through COVID need support & solidarity
- Resources & money (austerity!) being tight, we need to work together & become visible – opportunities for bette
- Need to continue to such assists demands a college

Key issues facing disabled people

- Austerity COVID economic damage as a cover for more
- BLM & Wider issues of intersectionality
- Brexit & Human Rights in the UK (eg UN Investigation int UK treatment of Disabled People)
- "Long COVID" = Chronic Fatigue, Brain Damage, Cardiovascular Disease
- Impact of COVID & everything online

 International Day of Disabled People in December 2021.

To do this we will need to:

Make sure that the people who run the events are able to contact the people who join them so they can work together

Show events live on Facebook as well as Zoom

Send an agenda for the events to the people who are joining before the meeting so they can read through the information and be prepared.

Make the events even more accessible.

Ask people what they would like the events to be about.

Spend more time planning for the events.
