The room will have: a black out tent with light up resources inside, a light up bubble tube, seated cushions around it, mirrored panels, bean bags, adult colouring, fidget toys, an electric fan, lowered lighting levels.



Leeds Autism Services will support people in the room, and make sure the room stays a calming space.

11:00am to 3:00pm - CHANGE Heritage project Balcony Area (3rd floor circulation space)








An exhibition of the CHANGE
